Subject and Predicate

A sentence is a group of words that makes complete sense.

Examples: 1. I ice cream love (not a sentence)

2. I love ice cream. (a sentence)

A sentence has two parts - Subject and Predicate.

Read the following sentences.

- 1. Manju is driving a scooter.
- 2. Geeta and her mother are sitting on the front seat of the car.

We are talking about Manju in the sentence (1).

'Manju' is the subject of the sentence (1).

The person or thing we talk about in a sentence is called the subject of the sentence.

"Geeta and her mother" is the subject of the sentence (2).

The subject may consist of one word or more than one word as shown.

In sentence (1), the words "is driving a scooter" is the predicate.

In sentence (2), "are sitting on the front seat of the car" is the predicate.

All that is said about the subject is called the predicate of the sentence.






