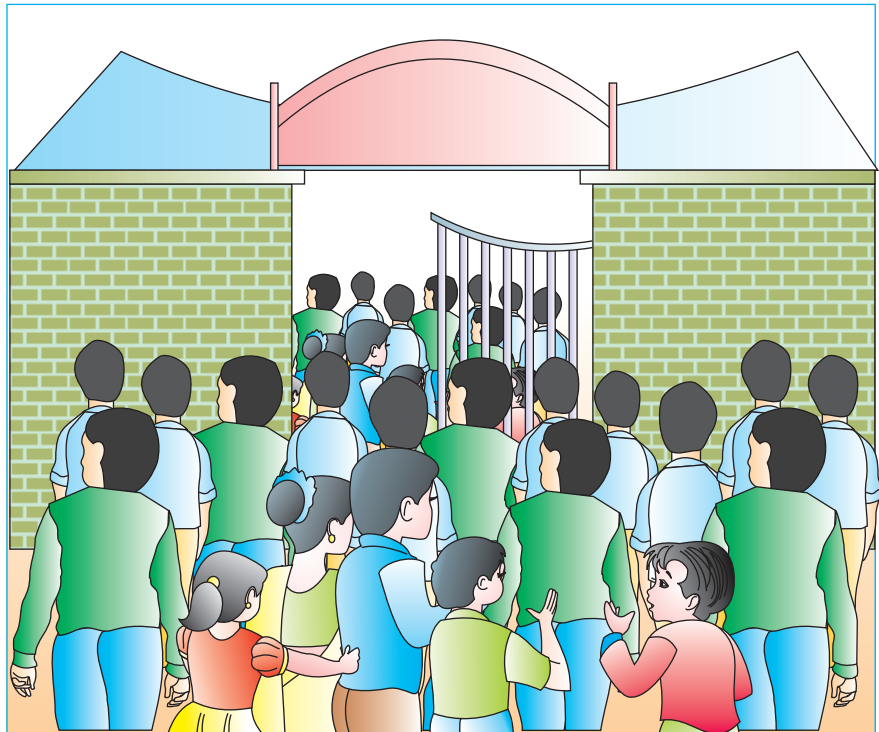

Hari and Sumant reached the Feroze Shah Kotla Stadium at four O' clock in the evening. They moved towards the entrance gate and were surprised to see a huge **crowd** of people over there.

It was going to be an exciting cricket match between the teams of Delhi and Bangalore. The match is being played in Delhi. The **IPL** T-20 matches are, no doubt, a crowd puller.

Suddenly, a man stood before them. He was selling **banners** and caps with slogans written in support of the Delhi team, the Delhi Daredevils. On the other hand, a lady was selling T-shirts and flags with **slogans** in support of the Bangalore team, the Royal



Challengers. Some boys and girls were busy **bargaining** and **purchasing** them.

Hari said, “Let’s go in first and sit down comfortably.” “The seats are not numbered, so let us **occupy** the front seats as quickly as possible,” said Sumant.

They showed their tickets to the ticket checker and went in. Within a few minutes, the two captains, Virender Sehwag of Delhi Daredevils and Daniel Vettori of Royal Challengers came for the **toss**. Bangalore won the toss and decided to bat first. The crowd shouted, “Come on Bangalore, you can do it.” Some of them yelled, “We are with you, Bangalore.”

The beating of drums and shouting of the spectators filled the air with some kind of magic. Hari and Sumant had never been to a stadium before to watch a cricket match. It was a completely new experience for them! The Delhi team came in for **fielding** and their supporters shouted loudly.

Tilakratne Dilshan and Chris Gayle came to bat first from the Bangalore team. The first bowler from the Delhi Daredevils team was Irfan Pathan. He bowled very fast and Chris Gayle hit the ball up in the air. The spectators shouted and clapped as it went out of the stadium. Hari said, “What a shot! Look, a fielder is

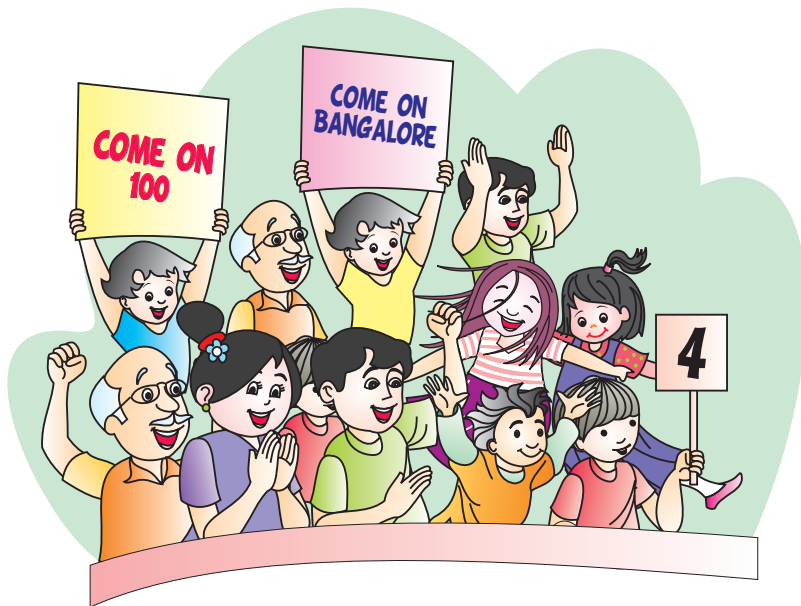

clean bowled by Irfan Pathan next. As soon as he saw that he was clean bowled, he left the stadium while waving at the cheering crowds.

Virat Kohli came in next and played well. At the end of twenty overs, Royal Challengers had scored 190 runs in all. People **cheered** for them. Then followed a break, so Hari and Sumant moved towards the **cafeteria**. Hari said, “Let’s have some snacks.” Sumant said, “Oh! The people are rushing to the cafeteria.” They bought two cans of orange juice and a big packet of popcorn. Soon, the match started.

Now it was time for the Delhi Daredevils to bat. Virender Sehwag and David Warner came to bat first. Their supporters cheered loud and clear. Zaheer Khan from the Bangalore team bowled first. Sehwag hit the ball straight and it crossed the boundary line. The **umpire** indicated that it was a four.

Later, the two batsmen scored 170 together. There was good bowling by other bowlers from the Bangalore team like Muttiah Murlitharan and Dirk Nannes. But David Warner was run out in the fifteenth over and Ross Taylor from the Delhi Daredevils came in to bat next. The game continued with lots of excitement.

At the end, there were five balls remaining and ten runs were needed for a win. Zaheer Khan bowled and Ross Taylor was caught out as the ball went up high for an easy catch. The catch was taken by Virat Kohli, but he slipped and fell badly while doing so. The match came to a **halt** and all the players rushed to his help. They

gathered around and helped him stretch his legs until the medical help arrived. Soon, all was fine.

Kevin Pietersen came in to bat but unfortunately could not score fast. There was absolute silence in the stadium. The score was 188 when Zaheer Khan bowled the last ball of the day. Pietersen looked at the ball and hit it hard, straight out of the stadium. And it was a sixer! Hari and Sumant shouted with others as they cheered this unbelievable victory. Sumant said, “What a **thrilling** match it was!” Hari nodded and smiled, “Indeed, it was.”

Simple Present Tense

Read the following sentences carefully.

1. The ticket checker **checks** all the tickets carefully.
2. The players always **reach** the ground on time.

In the above sentences, the coloured words are verbs (doing words). They are in the simple present tense.

❖ We use the simple present tense when the verb mentions an action without indicating whether it is completed, or is incomplete.

Example: I **play** with a ball in the evening.

- ❖ The simple present tense is also used to express an action that tells about a habit.

Example: I **drink** milk every morning.

- ❖ The simple present tense is also used to express general truths.

Example: The sun **rises** in the east.

Words like **is**, **am** and **are** are also verbs. They are called '**be**' verbs.

- ❖ We often use them as status verbs. They show what the subject of a sentence is.

Examples: 1. She **is** a cricketer. *Or* She's a cricketer. ('s = is)

2. We **are** cricket fans. *Or* We're cricket fans.

3. I **am** a big fan of Dhoni. *Or* I'm a big fan of Dhoni.

- ❖ We may also use 'be' verbs to form the continuous or progressive tenses.

Example: They are playing cricket. *Or* They're playing cricket.

We also use 'has' and 'have' as main verbs in the present tense. In such cases, they are used as ordinary verbs to show possession.

Examples: 1. He **has** two tickets for today's cricket match.

2. We **have** four tickets for today's cricket match.

In the above sentences, **has** and **have** show possession.

Present Continuous Tense

We use the **present continuous tense** (or **Present Progressive Tense**) to express an action that is going on at the time of speaking.

Example: The children are playing cricket.

You must have noticed that we write 'is' / 'are' / 'am' + action word + '-ing' to use verbs in the present progressive tense, e.g., bat + ing → batting and, write + ing → writing.

Simple Past Tense

We use the simple past tense to express an action completed in the past. We often use words like 'yesterday', 'last week', 'a month ago', 'last night', etc., when we indicate such an action.

Examples: 1. Virat Kohli batted well yesterday.

2. Zaheer Khan bowled well in the last match.
3. The players of Delhi Daredevils played well last week.
4. We bought five tickets for the match.



We usually add -d, -ed or change the form of verbs while using them in the simple past tense forms, e.g., love → loved, play → played, write → wrote and buy → bought.

Verbs like was, were, had are also used in the simple past tense.

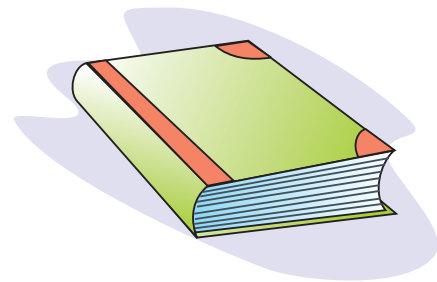
