


Well, I challenge you. I have observed you performing. There is a magic trick that I can perform with my eyes closed, but you cannot, with your eyes wide open.





Ha, Ha! It sounds simple. I'll be able to perform it here and now.

Read the following sentence.

I kept my shoes under the chair.

The coloured word is a preposition. A preposition is a word placed before a noun or pronoun to show its relation with some other noun or pronoun in the sentence. The word 'preposition' means 'pre+position'. This indicates 'placed before'.



A noun or pronoun following a preposition is called its object.

In the above example, under is the preposition and the chair is its object. A preposition is often used in a sentence with respect to time, position and place. Some important prepositions are on, in, above, at, for, to, into and of.

Examples: Rafiq was born at Jaipur in Rajasthan on 10 February 1990. He studied in my school for ten years and his performance was above the performance of others in the class. He often came to school by rickshaw. He was helpful to me and spoke on books and authors in most activity periods. Whenever he walked into the class, he smiled at others.

All the coloured words are prepositions.

You will note that we use in to show a location and into to indicate movement from a place.




